We get dirty and it can be hard, sometimes really hard, but it is a good place to be because if we use our Learner Qualities we can always make it to the other side and we are better for it.

Why The Learning Pit?

The Learning Pit shows students that it is ok to not know and that not knowing is not failure but rather a chance to grow. It promotes the idea of a growth mindset and builds a positive learning culture in the school where students are not afraid to fail and actively seek challenges, focussing on growth rather than levels.

SYDNEY SOUTH WEST GREG WAY AWARD

Congratulations to Mr Belgre who is the inaugural winner of the Sydney South West Greg Way award for his outstanding services to the Sydney South West School Sport Association.

Mr Belgre has been an active, dedicated, and passionate contributor to sport. He has exceptional organisational skills, evident across school Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics Carnivals and has coached PSSA boys and girls touch and soccer. Mr Belgre has successfully coached boys and girls touch football knockout teams, reaching the final series in 4 consecutive years (2016-2019). He has organised sport back at school for other teachers to implement and has reached out to local community sporting organisations to have expert quality programs delivered to our students.

Mr Belgre has dedicated 16 years of service to the East Hills PSSA and Sydney South West Sports Association. Through 8 years as the president of the EHPSSA, he has led the delivery of this High-Performance Gifted Education sports program across our community of schools. Under his leadership, the PSSA has established an enhanced collaborative relationship with school principals, created student opportunities to participate in a greater range of sports, built inclusive partnerships with parents across all schools, and became the first PSSA in NSW to include a K-2 school, Bankstown South Infants School.



Mr Belgre cultivates an inclusive and supportive culture in EHPSSA through supporting and encouraging younger teachers to be actively involved in zone events. He is proactive in mentoring and supporting new conveners as they undertake roles within the zone. He has recently utilised his skills to create an online portal for East Hills PSSA to assist with administration, communication, and the running of all the zone's carnivals and PSSA seasons. He actively led our East Hills zone throughout Covid to continue to provide sporting opportunities for our students. East Hills PSSA is privileged to be led by Mr Belgre and we at Picnic Point PS are extremely proud of his recognition for the Greg Way Award. Congratulations Mr Belgre!

CANTEEN – FRIENDLY REMINDERS...

It has come to our attention that students are either bringing large denominated notes to school, for example \$100 notes, or that parents are placing \$50 notes into paper lunch bags and asking the canteen to provide large amounts of change.

Once change is issued to the Student it is their responsibility for any large amounts of money remaining, to which if lost or misplaced the Canteen is not responsible if it happens to go missing.

It has been a long-standing policy of the school that students are not to have notes larger than \$5 or \$10. This is plenty of money to buy one or two items from the canteen. Accordingly, students do not need large sums of money so please do not send it to school with them.

The canteen does not hold large amounts of change on premises. We recommend that if you don't have small change then download the My School Connect App and order your child's lunch online.

In addition to this the canteen does have strict rules on students bringing in large amounts of money for shouting & purchasing for multiple items for friends. We encourage you to remind Students that this is not an acceptable practice.
